#### View from the Layne

August, season of holidays, that wonderful, necessary time for switching off, getting away, and being somewhere different. I made my bid for freedom a few weeks ago, spending time in Norfolk with family.

The getting away and seeing different things is one of the joys and so is having the time to get stuck into a book without that nagging feeling that there is something I should be doing. I had chosen a book set in Norfolk, in 1549, a time of social unrest, and religious upheaval. The major plot line was Kett's uprising, when a rebel band of the poor aided by disaffected soldiers took on the might of the establishment and the land-owning gentry. It was also the year in which Cranmer introduced his new Prayer Book, the first in English. Church attendance was compulsory back then and this was a massive change for everyone.

One day we went to the village of Salle to see the church dubbed Norfolk's Rural Cathedral. It was finished in 1450, 100 years before Kett, on money amassed by the 5 Lords of the Manor living in the parish and other successful landed gentry. Their wealth came from wool. They raised sheep on land which, to some extent, was common land they had enclosed. That is, they had illegally barred the peasants access to the traditional land the peasants had farmed and grazed. When enclosures started in the late 1300s the population was still low, the result of the plague that swept through Europe. As the population recovered, the lack of common land became a critical Issue. Poverty and hunger eventually triggered the unrest and uprising of 1549. That was 100 years after the completion of Salle church. It would be another 140 years before the Church of England produced the version of the Book of Common Prayer we still use today.

Salle church is massive, think Lydd. without the surrounding houses. Originally it was magnificently decorated with stained glass, wall paintings, much carving, also painted. The colour and much of the carving went in the early days of the Reformation.

But the building remains. Today it is still a working church with two services a month and some good concerts. Outside is a village of 21 houses and 50 inhabitants. There is a pretty brick-built village hall dated 1903 and a rather smart cricket ground, a little larger than Newenden's with a set of wheeled covers for the pitch parked on a further boundary.

Thinking about it now, if holidays are for being somewhere different and seeing different things, my holiday was a ride on the slow roller coaster of 700 years of history in a corner of Norfolk, with its ebb and flow of fortunes, ideas and influences. The one constant was a church in which God is worshipped and Christ is followed. How can I say that? Because of the small wall safe for visitors' donations. What was different about this one was it had two slots, one



marked Fabric and the other Life. Yes, this was definitely a functioning church. If you have not had your holiday yet, here is something to take with you: a prayer of blessing from the Northumbrian Community which in fact works well at the beginning of any day or any journey.

#### Rolvenden Community Speedwatch

Speeding traffic continues to be a problem on the A28 through Rolvenden and also in Rolvenden Layne

For example, on June 27th in just one hour our Community Speedwatch volunteers logged 11 speeding vehicles (35mph or over in a 30mph zone). Three of these drivers were over 40mph with speeds up to 47mph.



If a pedestrian is hit by a vehicle their chances of being killed are as follows:

- At 40 mph there is a
   90 percent chance they will be killed.
- At 35 mph there is a
  50 percent chance they will be killed.
- At 30 mph there is a
  20 percent chance they will be killed.
- At 20 mph there is a
- 2.5 percent chance they will be killed.

Rolvenden Community Speedwatch is looking for volunteers to join the Speedwatch Team and give an hour or two a week to help. The days and hours can be varied according to your availability, so can easily fit in with your other commitments.

Come the day we will be ready. We will twitch and rock as we are manoeuvred into place, as the dark place is held high. We will be shot forth into light and cold water.

#### Rolvenden Gardening Society Talk: Growing Flowers for Cutting

Sophie Leathart gave the above titled talk in the village hall to 25 members of the Gardening Society on the evening of 8th June.

She has been a freelance florist for 30 years, exhibited at Chelsea and other flower shows and more recently, has worked for Iris at Sissinghurst, who is now based near Marden.

After describing the history of cutting flowers from Medieval times, Sophie continued by talking about her own cutting garden, from which she cuts at least a couple of bunches of flowers and greenery each week. She



talked about which flowers were the most appropriate to use for cutting, the best time to pick them in the day and how to look after them once cut.

Sophie described four elements beginning with 'f' to note when picking flowers viz: *feature flowers; fragrance; fillers; foliage*.

Delphiniums and peonies, for example, make good feature flowers while sweet peas, roses and even herbs provide fragrance. Fillers could be wild carrots, annual salvia and statice, for example, while all flowers have foliage which aids any flower arrangement.

Finally, Sophie delighted us by putting a flower arrangement together with blooms from her own garden. She now uses chicken wire instead of floral foam because of the harm to the environment. When the arrangement was complete, she allowed us to dismantle it and take the blooms home.

It was an inspiring evening and hopefully, members will try out some of her ideas with blooms from their own gardens. *Maralyn Button* 





#### Weather and Nature Notes

June, like May, was rather dry, June also had record breaking temperatures. We had to wait over a month for some rain, as usual the north and west got the majority. Eventually some fell on the 18th and a bit more a couple of days later refreshing the parched earth a little, but not enough to fill my evaporating little ponds. The total rainfall for the month was a disappointing 27mm.

We are now into Summer and past the longest day, and already it has been hot and humid. Cereal crops are ripening and hay meadows are being cut, the hot sun saps the moisture from the cut grass and energy from my legs as I walk along, but the feeling I may miss out on a good sighting keeps me going. The grass underfoot has lost its spring lushness and looks a bit dry and chewy now for the animals. Meadow brown butterflies blend in with the more muted tones of earth and bleaching grasses, sometimes even their flight looks a bit laboured, slowly flapping a few feet or so before flopping into the cover of long grass, unlike smaller hyperactive skipper butterflies who dash about more energetically than the meadow browns and I. The hedgerows are now strewn with pretty bramble flowers that are a popular feeding place for a variety of butterflies and insects. It's a time of year when distinctive perfumes waft in the warm air: Privet hedges with their slightly sickly perfume, honeysuckle and lime trees. It takes energy for plants to produce these attractant perfumes, so they don't want to waste it, those adapted to attract moths wait until nighttime to release their lovely aromas, nicotiana, honeysuckle, mirabilis and cestrum being



a few you and moths can enjoy in your garden during the evening.

I had a couple of visits from a fairly large grass snake, I noticed it hiding amongst the lily pads in the warm water and have found it in my composter too. On cooler days slow worms hide in there also where they have a good food source of slugs and woodlice etc and are safe from predators.

Whilst strolling along Mounts Lane after a shower something purple caught my eye on the grass verge, an abrupt halt for closer inspection identified a beautiful purple hairstreak butterfly. They are not rare, but are rarely seen as they spend their life in and around the top of oak trees feeding on honeydew and hardly ever coming down lower. Butterfly books always suggest the use of binoculars to try and spot them, which shows how awkward they are to see. I have thought to myself over the years we have enough oak trees locally, there must be some about, well at last I have briefly seen one close up before it ascended back into the canopy. I have kept looking and I have seen a few more small butterflies flying around the tops of a few oaks in Pix's lane, they probably are purple hairstreaks but without binoculars I couldn't say for sure.

Something else that has appropriate habitat locally to be about, yet I have not seen one close up properly before, is the stock dove. I had the pleasant surprise of seeing a nervous pair in my garden recently. They are rather



attractive with plumage similar to a wood pigeon, but with a dark eye and smaller like a feral pigeon. I knew what they were but was lacking in knowing much about them. Research says that unlike wood pigeons and collard doves that are very common and frequent in towns and gardens, these are much less abundant and shyer, found in woodland edges

and arable areas and unlikely to visit gardens so are easily overlooked. They are also on the amber list of the UK conservation concern and fully protected, so the birds and nests cannot be harmed. It would be nice to see them visit again.

I think Mr and Mrs Blackbird in my garden deserve a mention for their tireless work, (and all parent birds) when I went out at 4.30 am to check my moth trap he was already out searching for food to feed young, and is out there until it is dark. It has been so dry and must be hard to find enough, so I didn't begrudge him an easy meal of a few beaks full of moths off the lawn attracted by my moth trap. Let's hope a good rain soon softens the ground for them all.

#### The Thoburn Land Trust - Update

Following the generous bequest from the late Miss Pat Thoburn of land in Rolvenden, the parish council have established a charitable Trust to manage the two plots, being the fields behind the church and the allotments.

The Trust are working in partnership with local charity Tenterden Wildlife\* to carry out some initial habitat surveys on the Thoburn land behind the church. Tenterden Wildlife have very generously agreed to carry out this work for free and their trained surveyors will be looking at trees, other plant life, birds. insects, reptiles and mammals to establish what is there.

The land is already listed as Grade II Park and Garden, listing reference 1000221.

The data will be available to residents at a Consultation Event on Sept 17th, when we will be asking for residents to give their views on the best future use of the area. We can then decide on the best way to manage the land and how that management might be funded.

Allotments – a draft lease has been offered to the Allotments Group and we look forward to working with them to further improve this valuable village amenity.

#### FOOD, GLORIOUS FOOD!

#### Non alcoholic drinks



When I was growing up there were not the plethora of soft drinks that are available today, but there were some very good fruit cups/punches served. I think nowadays they would be considered rather unsophisticated and too sweet for our tastes.

The origins of the alcohol-free cocktails can be traced back to the Prohibition in the U.S.A., they were known at the time as Temperance drinks and 'mocktail' was first used around 1916. The most famous is probably The Shirley Temple, a mix of ginger ale a splash of grenadine with a squeeze of lime or lemon and topped with a maraschino cherry.

They are some very fancy ones served in restaurants but there are many that are very easy to make without having a huge number of ingredients you wouldn't normally use.

ou can make as simple or elaborate as you wish, there are no rules, except you will need loads of ice, preferably crushed, easy to do, just put cubes in a bag and bash with a rolling pin. Serve in either pretty glasses or a highball and finish off with a garnish, slices or orange, lemon, lime, or cucumber, mint, raspberries etc.

Some recipes require a simple syrup which is equal parts of water and sugar heated until dissolved, once cooled this can be stored in



a clean jar in the fridge for up to a month. The base can also be fruit juices or cold tea, lapsang souchong is good as it has a smoky flavour. The mixers can be lemonade, tonic water, soda water, sparkling water, ginger ale or ginger beer.

In keeping with the tradition of cocktails, mocktails have some wonderful names, Parson's Walk, Pussy Foot, Long Boat, Sportsman,

Tonga, Virgin Mary to name a few of the older ones.

Mint Julep has been the official drink of The Kentucky Derby since the 1930's. Omit the bourbon and you have a very refreshing drink of ginger ale and fresh mint.

For a Mojito, crush fresh mint with a small amount of sugar, juice of three limes, crushed ice and top up with soda water or use ginger ale for a ginger Mojito.

A Moscow Mule is made the same way but with ginger beer to

give a bit of a kick, garnish all of them with slices of lime.

For a Pineapple and Lime punch, use 750ml pineapple juice mixed with 400ml tonic and lime to taste, or for a fruit punch 500ml pineapple juice mixed with 300 ml of orange juice and lemonade.

Cranberry Fizz is very simple, put ice in a glass or jug, pour in cranberry juice, I do about ¾ juice to topper but it's down to personal taste, can be made with either soda water, tonic or sparkling water, decorate with fresh raspberries, looks pretty and can be a good one for a Christmas party too.

An Elderflower Fizz is made by half filling a glass with ice, add mint leaves, lime juice, elderflower cordial to taste and top up with sparkling water. Recently many alcohol-free spirits and wines have become readily available which you could use if you wished.

There is lots of scope to make up your own and give them a fun name or name after one of the children or grandchildren, how cool would that be!

#### Rolvenden Neighbourhood Watch

Our focus month is on Distraction burglary and Securing your home when you're away



Distraction burglary is when burglars pretend to be someone they are not in order to gain entry to your home.

They might be...

- pretending to be from a care agency, the council or a utility company investigating a gas or water leak.
- seeking help to leave a note for a neighbour or even asking for a drink

of water if they claim to be thirsty or unwell.

- Claiming to be in a hurry or emergency and needing to get into your home quickly.
- Working in teams, with one person distracting you while the other searches your home.

#### How to prevent it

There are a number of things you can do to prevent distraction burglary. Always remember "if in doubt, keep them out":

- Use your door viewer to see who's there.
- If you open the door put the chain on first.
- Always ask for ID and check it with the company before letting somebody into your home.
- Use the phone number advertised in the phone book or online, as the number on their identity card could be fake. For a utility company, call the customer service department. Close the door while you do this.
- Remember that genuine callers won't mind checks. If you feel at all unsure, schedule a time for the caller to come back when a friend or relative is there.
- For pre-planned appointments with utility companies, a password scheme can be set up.
- of you feel threatened or in danger by the presence of the caller, call 999.

#### Securing your home when you're away

It's vital to leave your home secure whenever you leave it. Getting into an 'exit routine' can help ensure that you don't forget obvious, important things, like not leaving your valuables near windows, or no lights on if it will be dark before you get home. Here's what you should do just before you go out. Become a creature of habit.

Try to get into the habit of following your own course of action when you lock



up your home. This will ensure that you don't forget anything.

Here's what we recommend you do before you go out:

- Close and lock all your doors and windows, even if you're only going out for a few minutes
- Double-lock any door
- Make sure that any valuables are out of sight
- Keep handbags away from the letterbox or cat flap and hide all keys including car keys, as a thief could hook keys or valuables through even a small opening
- Never leave car documents or ID in obvious places such as kitchens or hallways
- In the evening, shut the curtains and leave lights on
- If you're out all day, then it's advisable to use a timer device to automatically turn lights and a radio on at night
- Set your burglar alarm



- Make sure the side gate is locked
- Lock your shed or garage
- Lock your bike inside a secure shed or garage, to a robust fitting bolted to the ground or wall, like a ground anchor

#### Going away?

Five tips to help you keep your home and belongings stay safe while you're away:

- 1. If you're off on holiday and wish to post anything on social media, make sure your posts aren't public and that they're only seen by your friends.
- 2. Leave lights and a radio on a timer to make the property appear occupied
- 3. Get a trusted neighbour to keep an eye on your property.
- 4. Consider asking your neighbours to close curtains after dark and to park on your drive.
- 5. Remember to cancel newspaper and milk deliveries.


