


This month's letter is from Rev'd Canon Lindsay Hammond From the Minister's Desk

Dear Friends,

Later this month, on the 11th June to be precise, we will celebrate the Feast of St Barnabas.

So what do we know about Barnabas? Of all the New Testament saints, Barnabas was perhaps the most generous. A well-to-do-man, he was generous with material things and gave a lot to the Christian cause. It's very easy to spiritualise everything and talk about generosity in every way except the most obvious – hard cash. We rather fight shy of it.

Barnabas was also generous in his judgement. He befriended the newly converted Saul, when everyone else



Barnabas showed a trust in people that believed them to be genuine. He showed a forgiveness that was able to let the past go. And he showed a faith that God knew what God was doing.

Barnabas demonstrated practical generosity and generosity of judgement. We must not fail to learn from that.

'Barnabas' means 'Son of Encouragement'. Barnabas made people feel valuable. He took them seriously, affirmed them, and asserted their value. We underrate encouragement as a Christian virtue. What an enormous difference Barnabas made to the lives that he touched. And what an enormous difference we can make to the lives of the people with whom we have to do, if we go out of our way to encourage, to affirm, to give value. We spend so much of our lives putting people down. People need lifting, encouraging, consoling. So let's all try and be a Barnabas, sons and daughters of encouragement! Generosity and encouragement – two words to take to heart as we thank God for Barnabas.

LIVING IN LOVE AND FAITH

In the summer, we will be running a course entitled, Living in Love and Faith. It comes in five parts and aims to help Christians think more deeply about what it means to be human. Living in Love and Faith provides a structured and accessible way to explore Christian teaching and learning about identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage. Each of the sessions of the course will address a key question: What does it mean to learn together as followers of Jesus Christ? How does our identity in Christ relate to sex and gender? What kinds of relationships does God call us to? Where do our bodies and sex fit in to all of this? How do diversity and difference affect our life together as a church?

The areas of life covered by Living in Love and Faith are currently the subject of much discussion and debate. The course will give us the opportunity to explore these issues and ponder why we think as we do, and to talk about how we as churches can handle these issues in a way which is sensitive, respectful and kind, mindful always of the enormous damage we can inflict on other people if we do otherwise. Each session will include an opening reflection about learning together, followed by teaching, time for discussion and Bible study, and end with an invitation to reflect on our learning, bringing it to God in prayer.

The course dates to note in your diary or on your calendar are: 12th July, 19th July, 26th July, 2nd August, and 9th August. These are all Wednesdays and the start time will be 7.30pm. The venue will be Tenterden Church. You will need to buy the course booklet (£5). Rolvenden History Group Lecture

7:15 for 7:30, Friday 2nd June – St Mary's Rolvenden Dr Claire Jones on 'Medicine in the Long Nineteenth Century' – a period that saw momentous change in health care.



Claire is a Senior Lecturer in the History of Medicine and has also worked in the heritage sector as Director of the Museum of the History of Science, Technology and Medicine at Leeds as well as Learning and Access Officer at the Infirmary Museum, Worcester.

Her research centres on the social history of medicine and health in Britain post 1750 to the present day. Her particular emphasis is on the relationship between medicine and commerce, and how that impacted on social history.

As well as her teaching and research Claire has also worked with non-academic partners to increase the

public understanding of medical advancement through the setting up of Museums including the Thackray Medical Museum Leeds, and the Florence Nightingale Museum London.

The Thackray Medical Museum invites visitors to follow the story of medicine through exploring a range of galleries that feature the grimy streets of Victorian Leeds, gruesome operations taking place in a 19th-century operating theatre, a 70s-style sexual health clinic, and charts how well the world responds to crisis. The Florence Nightingale Museum celebrates the life of the trailblazing woman who was the founder of modern nursing, one of our greatest Victorians and a female icon in her own lifetime and who is still an inspiration to nurses around the globe.

Dr Claire Jones has had a fascinating and wide ranging career and we are greatly looking forward to gaining insights into the state of medicine in the nineteenth century and the innovations that were made that lead to great improvements in health care.

Friends of Newenden Meadow Restoration

Here in Newenden, we are creating an organisation called 'Friends of Newenden Meadow Restoration', and invite you to join us, both from Newenden, Rolvenden and around, in this exciting project. The subscription will be £10 per annum, and as soon as we have a list of potential members, we can arrange our first meeting to talk about our future plans. Becoming a Friend will mean that you will be periodically kept up to date with everything that happens in the field. You will be invited to a summer event in the field when the flowers are at their best; and to any bumblebee, plant or conservation talks that we organise. Your £10 will go towards talks, buying of wildflower native plants, and equipment when necessary. There will be an annual meeting to give a report on the year's progress and future plans, and a treasurer's report. The important thing will be the opening of a bank account, so that subscriptions, donations, and grants can be properly and transparently accounted for. The meadow is looking really beautiful. Throughout May it was awash with buttercups. Now the Yellow Rattle is in flower. The tube shaped flower protrudes from a bulbous green, shell-like structure, giving it its scientific name Rhinanthus Minor, meaning 'small nose flower'. When its seeds form and ripen, they rattle in that air filled structure, which by then will have turned from green



to brown. Yellow rattle is very useful in a restoration meadow, being a hemiparasitic plant, which means it gets some of its nutrients by feeding on the sugars of nearby plants, particularly grass. It does this through its unique root

structure which allows it to attach itself to the roots of nearby plants. As a result it weakens the prevalent grasses around it and allows space for other wild flowers to grow.

In the field we are seeing an abundance of Meadow Vetchling this year. Greater Birdsfoot Trefoil is growing vigorously in a few areas near the scrape. Sorrel, Plantains, Common Vetch and False Chamomile are also appearing. The Yellow Flag Irises that we planted at the water's edge last year are flowering. Knapweed and Oxeye Daisies are prolific on the scrape islands and also spreading into other areas of the field.

This spring we have planted Field Scabious, Devil's Bit Scabious, Great Birdsfoot Trefoil, Meadow Cranesbill, Musk Mallow, Common Vetch and Red Clover in areas prepared by strimming. These plants were purchased with a



grant from Ashford Borough Council. Also with that grant we have bought a seat to go in the field so that people can sit quietly and absorb the sights, sounds and scent from the field.

Weather and Nature Notes

As soon as I had written about April trending towards drier weather the rains came. I measured 115mm. This Winter and Spring has generally been rather wet and chilly, with a few mild spells thrown in to confuse things. In conversation with a grower on the Romney Marsh he was saying it has been the worst he has known in over forty years, rarely has he still been planting up fields of potatoes in May. Also I expect a lot of nurserymen growing for the Chelsea Flower Show have found it difficult to get plants to perfection. It makes you realise how adaptable most plants are, that they survive a near 40 degree heat and drought in Summer, then nearly minus 10 degrees and wet in Winter. Now in May with some warmth and the daylight hours extending, the plants are putting on rapid growth and most look none the worst for it. The countryside must be at its peak of brightness and fresh beauty, with its lush new growth in every conceivable shade of green, trees in blossom, and some fields with the almost eye aching bright yellow flowers of oilseed rape. In the skies recent storm clouds of mountainous proportions built up, adding their own dramatic beauty to the scenery.

On a fine morning I went for a walk covering a different area of the parish for a change. As hoped it delivered the first cuckoo of the Spring for me, also the first orange tip butterflies. I mentioned last time that I had seen two Red kites, but they appeared to have moved on. I did see a single one, maybe one of



those? Swallow numbers are rather disappointing again. I only saw the odd one until well into May. I always keep an eye on the Dungeness Bird Observatory web site, and it seems there is a general lack of migrant bird arrivals. I have heard a nightingale, but it was in Woodchurch. As I left the Church after arranging flowers for the Coronation on the 5th, I was met with the scream of a swift, since then, their numbers have swelled to six that I have seen, effortlessly speeding across the skies above my garden. When you consider the perilous journey to and fro all these migratory birds perform, and then factor in, that in the case of a swift, it may be four years old before it breeds successfully, that is a lot of air miles and risks before it can add a new generation.

I saw a tawny mining bee taking a rest on a nettle leaf in the sun, the eye-catching females are bright and recognisable, unusually the males are duller. A harmless Spring solitary bee that is short lived, gone by about June. In that brief time will be some industrious pollinating and digging a tiny hole in a sunny lawn, or similar, to lay her eggs that will hatch next year. Also starting to appear on my nettles are the tiny young of dark bush crickets, they will grow quickly, their chirping calls are a sound of Summer evenings.

My little ponds are starting to look a bit more interesting now that the water temperatures have risen enough for the plants to start back into growth. If you

want a diverse wildlife rich pond, that is pretty low maintenance then don't add ornamental fish. Plenty of oxygenating weeds and marginal plants are essential for an algae free pond and for creatures from the miniscule upwards to hide and breed in. As some plants elongate out of the water, the first of my damselfly larvae climb them and emerge,



on closer inspection nearly every stem has the evidence. I can lose myself for quite some time peering closely into the waters, trying to spot the tiny stuff like hydra and fry for example. Newts have been egg laying for some time and their little tadpoles are hatching. They are mostly the more common smooth newt, but I have the odd palmate newt too. Also a few common frogs of various sizes bask in the pond or hide in the marginal plants, when you see a few together you can see how their main colouration can vary in shades of greens through to browns. It is that time of year when the non-native marsh frogs have started their laughing calls in the wider landscape, of ditches and ponds, they can be heard from quite some distance sounding as if they are all sharing a hilarious joke as more join in, but they need to keep vigilant as they would make a tasty meal for quite a few creatures.

FOOD, GLORIOUS FOOD!

In support of local producers



When we moved here twenty odd years ago I was very aware of the local produce that was available on our doorstep. We are incredibly fortunate to have so many small producers in the area offering a large variety of products.

Hinxden dairy based in Benenden produces milk, cream, creme fraiche and cheeses which are all excellent and available in Rolvenden and Benenden village stores, and they have a delivery service.

We also have Silcocks farm, shop and cafe. This is an organically run farm producing quality meat and dairy, they make their own cheeses and ice cream, including a dog friendly one. The butchering is done on site and you can have meat cut to your own requirements.

The cafe, which includes an outside area where dogs are welcome, serves delicious home-cooked foods, there is also a function room available for hire.

Chittenden farm shop sells very fresh vegetables and fruits in season at reasonable prices. Their apple and pear juice is I think one of the best, also local honey and frozen game from a local dealer. They do not accept credit cards, so cash or cheque.

Nightingales, (Gibbets Oak) sell their own seasonal soft fruit, apples, pears, cherries, asparagus, fruit juices and cider plus vegetables from local producers. Also a good selection of jams, pickles etc. They also sell their own cider.

The Potato Shop has the most amazing varieties of potato on offer, it is very difficult to choose, they have some very good recipes on their website, morghew.com

Also a range of game, their own honey and logs! Also available from our



Thursday market outside the church.

Little Angley Farm, offers, free range eggs, seasonal fruit, vegetables and flowers, local game in the freezer, including whole fillets of venison, I'm looking for an opportunity to buy one!

Charity Farm and Hartley Dyke farm shops both have good produce and a large selection of more unusual biscuits, jams etc. Hartley Dyke has a particularly good delicatessen counter, it is expensive but the quality is excellent.

I think Eggs to Apples is well worth a visit, they have an enormous range of excellent produce, the local, British and pesticide free are highlighted. When I went they had an amazing variety of tomatoes, many I had never seen before.

We are coming into the PYO season and an excellent place to go to is Tibbs Farm, once you have picked enough, relax in their cafe which has breath-taking views across the Tillingham Valley. The food on offer was homemade and looked delicious.

In the same direction is Suttons fish shop, this is now run by the next generation and as well as their very good fish and shellfish, I like their dressed crab, have extended their range to include fruit and vegetables, game, sausages, honey etc. Also tea and coffee to take away.

And their arrival here was not just the village's dream come true. Let Elsie tell the story:

'We have always wanted this little pub. When it came on the market in October it was almost a sign We were both living in Tenterden but we knew we would soon be moving to the Layne. We couldn't have been happier. The worst part of getting everything together was getting the kitchen up and running and the cleaning, after the pub having been closed for all those months. The best is by far the support we have had from everyone in Rolvenden,



Tenterden and Wittersham in particular. Seeing it open and everything finally coming together has been amazing.

The first week was absolutely insane! We could not have been more chuffed with the turn out on opening night. It was wonderful meeting all the regulars and being so well supported. Things are settling down, but still busy. As a pub, the beer is important. We are a Star pub, that's the pub arm of Heineken. But we are able to offer other beers and ciders as well as their inhouse brands. Currently we have: Moretti and Amstel Lager, Guinness, Neck Oil IPA and other ales from Harveys, Long Man – Long Blonde, Kingswood – 49er, Timothy Taylor – Land Lord and our ciders are Aspells.

We just want to stay the 'proper village pub' with a small menu, including the pub classics, a couple of lovely homemade mains and a selection of starters. There are some 'Boozy Bites' on the board. And of course there are homemade deserts, (Editor: supplemented by Judes' ice cream which is scrumptious in extreme, with a name like that of course it is!)

That is the business, but we want to be part of the community as well. That was why we were so pleased to be able to sponsor the Coronation Stoolball match between the Streyte and the Layne on 8th May. It was a great afternoon, the match on the Layne Field and then back here in the pub with the presentation of the Ewe and Lamb Coronation Trophy and much flipping of burghers.

There is much to look forward to in the months to come, including the return of the Trophy from the Streyte to the Layne when next year, We Win!'





Rolvenden Neighbourhood Watch

Our focus month is on advice regarding doorstep criminals and rogue traders

Please see the advice below as Kent residents are reminded to be vigilant against rogue traders operating in parts of the county

- If someone knocks at your door, always refuse on the spot repairs or maintenance.
- Don't allow anyone to pressurise you into agreeing to have work carried out. If you ask them to leave and they don't, contact the police on 999.
- Don't ever go to a bank or cash point with a trader; legitimate traders would never do this.
- Use reputable traders who are members of the KCC Trading Standards approved trader scheme: https://tschecked.kent.gov.uk/
- Ask for quotes in writing and check that the tradesperson is from the company they say they are from.
- Kent Police state: 'Some criminals will look to exploit more vulnerable members of our communities by charging exorbitant amounts of money for work that is often completely unnecessary or at best substandard. We would urge residents not to deal with cold callers who knock on doors offering work to clean driveways, repair roofs or to maintain garden shrubs, hedges and trees. We are also asking neighbours to keep an eye out for vulnerable people, including the elderly. If you see anything suspicious don't hesitate to call the police.

NEVER EVER AGREE TO UNSOLICITED WORK ON YOUR DOORSTEP NO MATTER HOW CHEAP AND ATTRACTIVE THE PRICE.

Jobs like patio cleaning and maintenance, roof work and gutter cleaning/repair are classic matters that end up with a job quoted £100 suddenly becoming £2000 with intimidation and aggression to obtain the payment. If a caller refuses to withdraw and leave

CALL THE POLICE ON 999 IMMEDIATELY.

If they leave still contact the police via 'Live Chat' or the non-emergency line 101. You may have resisted but a more vulnerable person down the road may not. Give the police as much information as you can: descriptions especially of any vehicles they are using.

These criminals will look to locate our elderly and our most vulnerable in the community especially persons living alone. Some victims are so embarrassed they do not tell the police or their families, so the police remain unaware and cannot put out alerts.

Actions you can take:

Ask for identification and call their company yourself (not on a number they provide) to check they are genuine.



- Ask the visitor to return another time when someone can be with you.
- Compare the price you have been given, get three written quotes. Ask family and friends for recommendations.
- Agree payment arrangements and start and finish dates in writing beforehand, and never pay in full until you're completely satisfied with the work.

Remember pressurised selling on your doorstep is a crime and you can report it:


