

## From the Vicar's Desk

Safeguarding. There, now I have said it! But I would urge you please to read on.

#### Safeguarding.....

We keep hearing the word, we keep talking about it. Safeguarding permeates all that we do in all of our churches. But what is it? Why do we need to talk about it? What has it got to do with God and Church?

First of all, here is what Safeguarding is NOT. It is absolutely NOT a slight or indictment on any individual. It is NOT a pointing finger. This is a common misconception, as if a judgement is being made.

Safeguarding is the general term we use to refer to the training that is necessary for members of our churches to be as sure as they can that the church they attend is a place of welcome, love and safety.

The training usually (but not always) takes the form of a one and a half hour course that can be completed online in your own time – but there are also some occasions when it can be done face to face. This training is designed to give participants a good understanding of the signs of abuse that are sadly all around us – from spiritual abuse and neglect to sexual abuse and coercion – and also information about the mechanism for reporting this. This training covers both children and vulnerable adults.

Once basic training is done the participant is in a far better position to be aware of what could be going on around them because the problem is that abusers do not enter our communities and announce their intentions - and church communities, because of their openness to anyone, are sadly places where offenders can try to infiltrate. So, the more eyes and ears we have, the better.


Over the coming months, we will be talking with a variety of different groups within our churches to ensure that everyone who needs to be trained is able to access a means of training that works for them and can therefore be compliant with the expectations of the Diocese of Canterbury and the Church of England. We have now completed training for all serving members of our PCCs and bellringers and soon will be talking with welcomers / sidespeople and anyone engaged in any form of pastoral work – from preparing and serving lunches to visiting.

God calls us each to care for one another and to look out for the most vulnerable in society. We see Jesus doing this in his life and ministry and we have a responsibility to do so too.Safeguarding is not just something to talk about and write about – safeguarding is something that it is incumbent on as many of us as possible to DO!

Your church has its own Parish Safeguarding Officer – check the website and the church noticeboard for more information about them and also what to do if you should have any concerns about an individual.


## St Mary's celebrates a very special person's very special birthday

## Weather and Nature Notes

Another month and another UK weather record, September had the joint warmest average temperature and a total of 43mm of rain, about half of that total fell in a couple of days which was needed. The first half of October continued the very mild theme with temperatures reaching the low to mid 20's and breezes from a mild direction, it felt as if Summer did not want to leave us and jumpers could remain forgotten in the wardrobe. Although the evidence is there that short day length and the chilly weather that comes with it are on the horizon: holly trees look bright and festive loaded with berries, as is my pyracantha to the point I can barely see any greenery. Squirrels are avidly collecting conkers, chestnuts and acorns etc and burying them for another day, odd leaves are losing their greenness and tumbling to the ground and my Christmas cactus that spends Summer in the garden is in flower. Also, on the 8th of October I saw my first Winter migrants, a flock of about 30 redwings flying over. But in this Autumn transitional period when you can feel the sun on your back, the skies are blue and pretty butterflies flutter by whilst humming bees visit the late flowers of red hot pokers, salvias, verbena and asters amongst others, you focus on and enjoy these Summer like moments. A call from a buzzard took my attention to the sky to witness it stoop and rise into barrel rolls and loop the loop so effortlessly as if it feels the same way and was just doing it for the sheer joy.

As I write though, Autumn is asserting itself with a nice bit of rain to water in various new plants, the winds now come from a cold direction and a storm is in the forecast. Jumpers are now required but a bright day is still very pleasant. During the warm weather a stunning male willow emerald damselfly visited my little pond, looking very handsome, as the name suggests a metallic green jewel like insect. I have noticed a few around other ponds since, apparently, they are recent colonists spreading out from the Norfolk area.

Some fields have a cover crop mix including buckwheat that are now in flower. A valuable source of late nectar for bees, although disappointingly I haven't spotted any foraging on it as yet, but it looks attractive and adds to the Summery feel to see a field in flower. Fungi are commonly associated with Autumn, an intricate looking cauliflower fungus was an interesting spot under a fir tree which, apparently, they favour. From a distance it had the size and appearance of a cauliflower, but on closer inspection it had a looser form than the tight head of its namesake. They are edible but I would rather appreciate its beautiful form than taste. Fungi come in many different colours, forms and sizes. It makes a refreshing change to see ones that are different.

Gill Pooley had an unusual encounter on a walk, as a large caterpillar made its way across the road, she contacted me for an identification. From her description it sounded like a goat moth caterpillar, but I needed a photo or to see it to be sure. She went back to try and find it, but unsurprisingly it had moved on. I showed her a picture of one and she confirmed this was what she saw. This caterpillar eats wood which takes time to digest so they can take up to five years to complete their life cycle. It seems the larva smell like goats thus the name, and as my moth expert friend Ashley pointed out when I told him about it, they have very strong jaws to munch through wood so can give you quite a nip.

## A Willing Volunteer

One Thursday evening earlier in the year I attended a meeting of the Parish Council as a member of the public. I heard the councillors discussing the sorry state of the two Rolvenden village finger sign posts and whether it would be possible to spruce them up. Then, before I knew it, I asked "what's involved?" and found myself volunteering to give them a lick of paint!

In reality what was needed was a bit more involved. The traditional finger posts' beautiful old oak had suffered over the years and needed quite a bit of maintenance before the paint pot could even be opened. Over a number of weekends, the posts were washed to remove the build-up of lichen and moss, letters were removed and polished or painted, cracks were filled, joints were stabilised, drooping fingers were lifted and they received a thorough sanding down. The posts were then undercoated twice and finally given a couple of coats of gloss to bring them back to gleaming white.

It was a bit of a challenge getting the job done with only my weekends spare and the weather didn't always respect that – a heatwave, high winds and a rainy spell earlier in the season, all delayed play! The speed of traffic on our local roads was an eye opener too. My wife, Debbie, often joined me to keep a watch out whilst I was on the ladder on the road side. A huge respect to our community Speedwatch volunteers who are working to keep us safer.

As well as the satisfaction gained from helping to preserve the finger posts for a few years to come, I thoroughly enjoyed the brief exchanges with villagers and visitors who stopped to take an interest in what was going on. Far from regretting asking that initial, curious question, I can thoroughly recommend stepping up and doing a bit of volunteering – it's great to take care of our village and also to be able to help each other out.

## Hop Pockets and Me

You may have seen my hop pocket offerings at the August Bank Holiday Art Exhibition in the Village Hall: cushions, door stops/wine bags and draft excluders. Each one can be personalised with words and significant dates.

I had moved into Rolvenden a few months before the Flower Festival weekend and I was glad of the opportunity to meet new people. But this was not the first example of my handiwork in Rolvenden. Some years ago, I made the blue cushions for the pews in St Mary's. Upholstering was my trade back then. Richard Coleman was the churchwarden in charge of the project. He dropped down to my workshop to check on progress. We chatted about this and that, including hop growing and hop pockets, something Richard knew all about.

Some years later I remembered our conversation when my parents' 50th wedding anniversary was looming. Mum and Dad had spent their honeymoon hop picking and I had the brilliant idea I would give them a hop pocket to mark the occasion. I went to see Richard. He gave me one of the post-war hop pockets, a mixture of polypropylene and jute that had replaced the all-jute pockets. I had my template. But Mum said No Thank You.

That was not the end. I gradually formed ideas for developing the pocket. I visited Richard in his home in Rolvenden. I was after some help with the lettering and Richard's workshop just might have something to offer. He explained that each year the pockets were bought customised with the name of the producer, the parish, the county name and insignia already printed. The grower added the date and the number of the pocket, done with a stencil.

Richard did not have any stencils, but he gave me some old pockets. Helped by a printer friend I made wooden printing blocks, different sized letters and numbers and bigger blocks for the county insignias. I worked out a simple system for printing. I was used to working with hessian but for this new venture I wanted a heavier hessian that would come closer to the jute. I found it in the same width as the jute would have been, possibly woven on the same machines. I acquired a 100-yearold industrial Singer sewing machine. From the markings on the base, it must have started out in a factory. Someone added an electric motor, and it does all I need. Kent and Sussex Hop Pockets was born.

Thinking back over the story, it feels right that I have arrived in Rolvenden. I have a new workshop. I take my pocket items to various craft fairs, and I am very happy to receive inquiries by phone or email.

## FOOD, GLORIOUS FOOD! The Medlar



I think the medlar tree is rather forgotten or maybe just out of fashion which is a shame as it has lots going for it. It is easy to grow, is selffertile meaning you only need one, and mainly pest free and once you have achieved the shape you want they don't require much pruning. The tree is very attractive with a spreading and almost weeping look. Ideal for an ornamental tree in a lawn. The tree doesn't produce masses of blossom but large pink or white flowers which look very striking against the long leaves which will turn yellow and red in autumn providing wonderful colour to the garden. The fruit is rather an acquired taste which is a pity, i think this is largely due to it not being the most appetising looking being green turning brown which perhaps puts people off trying it. They ripen at the end of November to early December. The advice used to be to place them stem down in straw and store in cook dark place for several weeks until they had "bletted" which is a chemical process where enzymes in the fruit break down the carbohydrates into fructose and glucose and the hard flesh softens to something similar to a baked apple, but now it's suggested you pick them as soon as they start to ripen, the fruit ripens in patches, store some in a cool dark place and let the others ripen in your fruit bowl. This will take a few days, eaten fresh they are very squishy and taste rather like apple purée with maybe a hint of date or apricot. Medlars along with apples, pears and guinces are part of the Rosaceae family. They have been cultivated for thousands of years and

were common in orchards throughout Europe. When they were first grown here it was only on royal estates and monasteries, Henry V111 had them planted in his orchard at Hampton Court along with apple, pear and quince trees.

By the 17th century they were as popular here as apple and pear trees. The fruit was produced for both commercial and domestic use. Sadly, nowadays they are not readily available and the best way to get some is to find someone who has a tree in their garden, or try a local market. In literature the medlar was used as a symbol of prostitution or



destitution, probably as it was perceived as being rotten before it was ripe.

The Victorian's enjoyed them as a dessert fruit often served with a glass of port.

Today medlars are most commonly used to make jelly or chutney, both of which are delicious with meats, game and cheese. They can also be roasted in the oven, put a clove in each cleaned medlar, place in a

buttered ovenproof dish and cook for about 10 minutes until soft. To make a sauce to go with pork as an alternative to apple, spoon the flesh from ripe medlars and cook to a pulp with a little water, when soft sweeten with brown sugar and add a little cinnamon and lemon juice to taste. Recently there has been some interest shown by a few cookery writers and I am hoping the medlar will become popular again. The tree is very hardy and well suited to our climate. Lavinia

Crossroads Care is the leading Carers charity in Kent delivering home based care and support for anyone living with the challenges of caring unpaid, for a family member or friend who is ill, frail, disabled or has mental health problems.

Our bespoke Carers services help carers get the extra support they need to live their own lives. Each caring situation is different and our experienced Care Managers work with individual Carers to make sure we can help them in the best way possible.

We are able to provide trained and experienced members of care staff, free of charge, to provide replacement care on a regular basis to enable a Carer to go out and have some time for themselves and we can also provide support to help with an emergency 24/7. For example if a Carer has been taken to hospital, we can stay with their loved one for a few days to prevent them having to go into care, or we can be with a Carer to help out during a short period of crisis in the home, or when someone is dying so that their Carer is not on their own when it happens.



## **Rolvenden Neighbourhood Watch**

Our focus this month is a reminder about Burglary prevention with Guidance on protecting your home and preventing burglary

#### To help you protect your home: Think WIDE(N):

- Windows, Lock your windows.
- Interior, put your interior lights on a timer.
- Doors, double or deadlock your external doors.
- Exterior, put your exterior lights on a sensor.
- (Neighbours) keep an eye on what is going on.

Research from Nottingham Trent University shows that a set combination of security actions provides up to 50 times more protection for your home versus no security. A combination of WIDE actions is the most effective and recommended by police throughout the country. Additionally, at Neighbourhood Watch, we believe neighbours keeping an eye out for each other is also key to preventing burglary.

#### How you can protect your home...

## Opportunity plays a big role in enabling crimes to be committed, particularly burglaries. Criminals will look for homes that:



- Seem unoccupied.
- Have little or no apparent security.

Have doors or windows left open or where they think they won't be seen.

As a general rule, if it looks like there is someone inside, the burglar is likely to go elsewhere. A home in a dilapidated state will seem easier to break into, so a simple deterrent might be tidying up a garden, or repainting doors and window frames.

As with all types of crime, prevention is much better than cure. Taking simple measures, such as locking your windows, leaving indoor lights on a timer, double or deadlocking your doors, and having exterior lights on sensors, can significantly reduce your chances of being burgled.

With summer drawing to a close and the darker nights creeping in, now is a good time to ensure your

home is as secure as possible. However, you don't need to spend a fortune to protect your home.

An upgrade to your front door with a high grade cylinder lock and perhaps a smart video doorbell, a much cheaper option than CCTV.

If your property is unoccupied, another trick to deter burglars is to make it look as though somebody is home, and one of the easiest ways to do this is by lighting the inside of your home. By using timers or smart plugs, you can set a small lamp to come on as the evening sets in, helping to light up the home but prevent wasted energy by leaving the lights on all day.

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
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
